

Summary

"Known for, among other things, wearing a large fur coat wherever he went, storyteller Edward Gorey was respected for both his brilliance and his eccentricity. As a child, he taught himself to read and skipped several grades before landing at Harvard (after a brief stint in the army). Then he built a name for himself as a popular book illustrator. After that, he went on to publish well over one hundred of his own books, stories that mingled sweetness and innocence, danger and darkness, all mixed with his own brand of silliness. Illustrated with Gorey-like humor and inspiration by Chloe Bristol, this stunning picture book biography about this beloved creator is the first for children." (amazon.com)

Book Conversation

After reading the story aloud, you may use the following questions to prompt a book conversation with students.

- What does illustrate mean? Have students hare some of their favorite illustrators. Ask what it is about their style that they like about them?
- What was so special about the published names in Edward stories?
- How were Edwards books different from others? Are there any you can compare to today's books?
- What were some things that Edward accomplished at a young age? What did he do that helped him determine his life path? How could you connect something you like to do with determining your life path?

Extension Activities

- 1. Since Edward came up with an author's name in a weird way, the students in the class can do the same with their names. Invite them to write a silly story using their new pen name.
- 2. In the stories, Edward was bullied and called names. The students will write all the names they have been called on a piece of paper and then crumble it up and throw it away.
- 3. Each student will have to write a spooky story and come up with illustrations to match the story line. They will also use one of the made-up names as the author.
- 4. There are unique drawings of people and characters in the book. The students could draw themselves as if they were a character in the book.
