

Summary

Book Conversation

After reading the story aloud, you may use the following questions to prompt a book conversation with students.

- What is a moth? Why are moths important to the environment?
- What was the mixture the kids used to make the "bait" or nectar for the moths? Is there anything else they could use to make the bait?
- How do you know for sure if you are looking at a moth or a butterfly?
- The moth has a four-part life cycle, what are they? Explain.

- Have the students make nectar for moths with the bananas and sugar, then let the student brush the nectar on a piece of fabric, then pin the fabric on the board and sit it outside in a secure place to trap the moths for research purposes the next day in class.
- Students can research, draw, and label different kinds of moths and share them with the class.
